A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR STEVE

When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came not only because of Jesus but also to see Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. So, the chief priests planned to put Lazarus to death as well, since it was on account of him that many of the Jews were deserting and were believing in Jesus.

John 12:9-11 NRSV

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

The story of Lazarus is one of my favorites in the Bible. In the Lazarus story, we are given an image of a God who is present with us and weeps with us when we suffer. The good news of this Gospel story is that death has lost its sting because of God's life-giving power through faith.

One time, a parishioner asked me what happened to Lazarus after being raised from the dead. The scripture on top is from John's Gospel, which explains what happened afterward. Can you imagine how the world would respond if a spiritual healer brought someone back from the clutches of death? What would the world say if there were people who had some power over death? Would there be anxiety and fear because of those individuals?

As Christians, God has given us some power over death. When we co-create with God by doing God's work with our hands, life-giving results can unfold. Perhaps a good question to explore is, "How has Christianity been life-giving for the world?"

The information used in the next section relies on information gathered from pursuegod.org and elca.org.

Christianity and orphans

Christians have always had a heart for the least privileged members of society, particularly orphans. Jesus was born to a single mom, Mary, and was adopted by Joseph. The Bible speaks about salvation in terms of adoption. You are adopted into God's family. And Christians have a responsibility to care for orphans. For centuries, Christians have built orphanages and provided for those without a mom and a dad. Even today, many Christians continue to move to challenging parts of the world to support the most vulnerable groups of people.

Jesus and women

In Jesus' context, women would hold a lower place in society than men. Additionally, husbands were permitted to treat their wives in ways that could be considered akin to treating them as property. Jesus, however, raises the placement of women in society and creation. We see this in Jesus' inclusion of women in his inner circle. Jesus acted honorably toward women, and he commanded his followers to do the same. Christians are to love people as Christ loves the church.

Christianity and education

Christians have always valued education. It is because of the works of monks and priests that many of the great works of Western literature were passed down to us. Advancements in education have been made by Christians, such as the printing press, which Johannes Gutenberg invented. Many of the first American universities were Christian institutions.

Christianity and slavery

Slavery was a reality in the time of the Bible. God did not instruct His people to initiate an abolitionist movement in the Roman Empire. Instead, the Bible's teaching about being made in the image of God paved the way for the end of slavery. Christians have been inspired by their faith in Jesus to bring an end to slavery. Many American abolitionists were Christians, and a significant number of individuals in the modern American civil rights movement, such as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., were also Christians.

Christianity and medicine

Christians were among the first to establish hospitals in the Roman Empire and subsequently throughout the Western world. Even today, Christians are often the first to bring hospitals and quality medical care to the developing world. In the Roman Empire, Christians would typically remain in the cities during plagues to care for the sick and the afflicted.

Christianity and prison reform

In the 1800s, prisons were terrible places, particularly in England. Conditions were the worst for women who often had to bring their children with them into prison. Women who had stolen a few coins were put next to women accused of murder. Christians throughout history have worked tirelessly to bring reform to the prison system.

Christianity and the poor

Jesus was known for his care for people with low incomes. From the beginning of the Christian church, Christians have understood their role to be one of helping those in need. Throughout the ages, Christians have put together societies and missions for those on the margins of society. Some of the most notable institutions that continue to help the poor today were founded by Christians.

These examples demonstrate to us that God has given us some power over death. When we co-create with God by doing God's work with our hands, life-giving results can unfold.

Ultimately, we can recall that God has worked through Christianity in life-giving ways and will continue to do so, even if the church body is not perfect. I think it is essential to acknowledge that we are not perfect, but with God working through us, anything is possible. God has given Christianity new life by providing us with a purpose for which we are sent to feed the world with grace and love. It is through the grace and love of God that Christianity has worked against death to bring forth something life-giving for the world.

SERVICE TEAM UPDATE



Summer Collection Project

Once again, we will be collecting new and used **SHOES** for "Soles for Jesus".

Soles For Jesus exists to share God's love by distributing shoes to the underserved in sub-Saharan Africa. This valuable gift prevents disease and enables individuals to work safely and attend school.

What types of shoes does SFJ accept? All shoes! They accept new and used shoes of all types and sizes. Any unusable shoes will be repurposed, and every pair will be put to use.

What will be done with the received shoes that are not adequate for sending to Africa? Shoes that are not adequate in the African climate and terrain (i.e., winter boots or high heels) or are not usable due to excessive wear will be repurposed through micro-enterprises. Micro-enterprises represent one of the most effective ways to lift families out of extreme poverty in devastated economies. Small business owners can use our repurposed shoes to earn money for food and as a sustainable source of income.

Shoes may be brought in during the month of July and placed in the boxes in the Narthex. To help defray the cost of shipping shoes to Africa, we will place a collection jar near the boxes to accept donations of money. The challenge is to collect \$1-\$2 per pair of shoes donated. So go through your closets and bring in your shoes and a dollar.


