

Why is Church Important?

1. Church Gives People Meaning and Purpose

Why this matters:

Research consistently finds that people who are actively involved in healthy faith communities often report stronger social connections, higher levels of volunteering and charitable giving, greater resilience during hardship, and a deeper sense of meaning and purpose. While church is not the only place people can find these things, it uniquely brings them together around a shared commitment to love God and love neighbor.

When people encounter God's grace, they often become more compassionate neighbors, more engaged citizens, stronger families, and more generous servants. Ultimately, the church's greatest gift is not merely the programs it offers but the people it forms.
